There shall we see him face to face, There shall we know the Great unknown, And Jesus, with his glorious grace, Shines in full light amidst the throne.


When we put off this fleshly load, We're from a thousand mischiefs free, Forever present with our God, Where we have long'd and wish'd to be.

Sermon: 1 Peter 3.13-17 Using suffering to save

MARK 9.14-29

Unbelieving belief

"If you can do anything, have compassion on us and help us." Jesus said to him, "If you can believe, all things are possible to him who believes." Immediately the father of the child cried out and said with tears, "Lord, I believe, help my unbelief!"

There are folks who haven't given up on Christ, but they doubt He can help them with their problem. They come to Him not out of assurance in His willingness or power, but out of desperation, having no where else to go. The father in Mark's account of the demonized boy, to some degree, is everyman.

We'll look at his story under three headings.

A DEBILITATING CONDITION

It was a bad case (vv 17–18,22). Matthew uses the word that literally means *moonstruck* (17.15, lunatick/epilepsy), which seems to have been the local explanation for demon possession. For years ("from childhood," v 21) a boy had been speechless, subject to involuntary seizures that threw him to the ground, caused him to foam at the mouth, grind his teeth, go stiff as a board, and fall into fire or water: a cycle of onstant agony, fear, and nightmare. You can be sure the parents had done everything they could to find a cure, but without success. Whatever hope they had put in the disciples (Matt. 17.16) had been shattered by the disciples' failure.

A DESPAIRING CONFIDENCE

The severity of the demon and the failure of the disciples had shaken the father's confidence. He didn't want *not* to believe; he wanted to believe, but he wasn't sure he had a basis for doing so. His admission, "I do believe; help me with my unbelief," perfectly expressed the challenge to our faith we've all felt at one time or another.

A DRAMATIC CONCLUSION

A phrase is repeated: "If You can " $(v 22) \dots$ "If you can" (v 23). If there is any "if" (uncertainty) in a situation, it's in us, not Christ. Whether the father doubted Christ's power or willingness is irrelevant; he should have doubted neither. Nor should we. Christ can hold up His end of the bargain; but can we?

Isn't it comforting to read that the man's defective faith didn't limit Christ's power? If the Lord made blessing contingent on perfect faith, praying a perfect prayer, or having a perfect day, how many of us would be blessed? The Lord bears with our infirmities, piles grace on top of grace (Jn. 1.16), and helps us to higher ground.

I suspect that ever after his son's healing, the father's faith wasn't shaky, but unconquerable (Rom. 8.37).

Israel is mainly occupied by Jews who have no valid claim to it, who are surrounded by Arabs who hate them with a murderous rage for taking land they (the Arabs) had owned and occupied for centuries. Nothing has changed much since the time of Amos (1.11–2.1). If the wolf and lamb are ever to coexist in that little strip of land called Israel, it will have to be by the gospel—a gospel that is hard to find today in the Bible lands. kenny
